

At Victoria Road Primary School, we follow the Fisher Family Trust Success For All phonics programme for the teaching of early reading. On entry to Reception the children take part in formal daily Phonic lessons which involves learning a new GPC each day and a daily 'stretch and read' segment which teaches blending for reading. As the children develop their blending skills they will then begin to take part in daily reading sessions which involve reading books that are fully decodable and are linked to their phonic knowledge. It is our aim that by the end of the Reception year all children will be able to confidently apply their phonic knowledge to read decodable books.

At Victoria Road Primary School, we understand that before children are able to form letters correctly they need to have developed control over their gross and fine motor skills. Within our curriculum children are given the opportunity to run, jump, hop,balance, throw and dig. In addition, children's fine motor skills are developed through the different areas including, building during block play, small construction, manipulating playdough and developing scissor control. Our writing programme is sequenced alongside the teaching of phonics to ensure that children have opportunity to apply their phonic knowledge. In addition to the formal teaching of writing during phonic lessons, opportunities to model writing skills are plentiful throughout the provision.
