


Early Years Curriculum Reading

At Victoria Road the Early Years Curriculum is research based, understanding that Birth to 5 is a unique neurological and developmental phase. The curriculum plans for concrete learning experiences, the opportunity to revisit ideas in a variety of contexts and the embedding of learning behaviours which underpin the Characteristics of Effective Learning. In the Early Years learning is not compartmentalised and everything links.



Our Early Years Curriculum is based around the Early Excellence Triangle Model which divides learning into three strands, Continuous Provision, Enhanced Provision and Directed Activities.

In the Early Years children's **Reading** is developed through **All Strands of the Curriculum Triangle** however **word reading and comprehension** is taught through **Directed Teaching** using the *Fisher Family Trust Phonic Scheme Talking Through Stories and Favourite Five.* The Reading Spine has been carefully developed to ensure that our children are exposed to high quality literature with ambitious vocabulary. Opportunities to share and retell a favourite story are available throughout the **Continuous Provision** and books linked to themes such as seasons and celebrations are provided through **Enhanced Provision**. Through small world play, puppets and role play, children are supported in bringing stories to life and the language of storytelling is carefully modelled through skillful adults. Each area of the Continuous Provision is supported by carefully selected texts to promote discussion, develop vocabulary and deepen learning experiences. In addition, the classroom has a cosy book corner which encourages

the sharing of favourite stories. A library basket containing favourite stories is available for children to borrow and share with their families.
