Chronological understanding

Sequence 3 or 4 artefacts from distinctly different periods of time.

Match objects to people of different ages.

Use words to show the passing of time: old, new, past, present, before, after, same, different, similar

Range and depth of historical knowledge

Recognise the difference between past and present in their own and others' lives.

Know and recount episodes from stories about the past.

Begin to show an understanding of what makes a person significant



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Interpretations of History

Use stories to encourage children to distinguish between fact and fiction.

Can make deductions about artefacts, spotting clues to use.

Compare adults talking about the past - how reliable are their memories?

Historical Enquiry

Find answers to simple questions about the past from sources of information.

Realise that we can find out about events and people's lives by using a range of sources.

Organisation and communication

Communicate knowledge through:

discussion, drawing pictures, drama/role play, making models, writing, using ICT.
